If You Are the Victim of a Crime

A person's life can be impacted many ways when they become the victim of a crime. The Kernersville Police Department is providing this brochure to assist you in locating community resources and information you may not be aware of that may be beneficial to you during this difficult time.

Victim's Rights

The Kernersville Police Department is dedicated to informing all victims of their rights.

Victims have the right:

- Have reasonable, accurate, and timely notice of court proceedings of the accused, and be present at court.
- To be heard at court proceedings Involving a plea, sentencing, or release of accused.
- The right to receive restitution.
- To be given information about the crime, how the criminal justice system works, the rights of victims and the availability of services for victims
- To receive information about the conviction or final disposition and sentence of the accused.
- To receive notification of escape, release, proposed parole or pardon of the accused, or notice of a reprieve or commutation of the accused's sentence.
- To present their views and concerns to the governor or agency considering any action that could result in the release of the accused, prior to such action becoming effective.
- To confer with the prosecution

Domestic Violence Victims

The goal of a domestic violence abuser is to achieve and maintain control over their victim. They may do this by using physical violence, emotional abuse, isolating the victim, economic control, intimidation, coercion or threats.

Abuse may include:

Rape and Sexual Offense-if the offender has vaginal intercourse with the victim against their will, may or may not include use of a weapon. Assault-the act or attempt to cause immediate physical injury or putting the victim in fear of immediate bodily harm. Domestic Criminal Trespass-can occur only after the victim and former partner have began living at separate residences and the victim has requested them not to be present at their residence.

Communicating Threats-a threat is communicated to the victim verbally or in writing, and is made in such a way that the victim believes it will be carried out.

Stalking-a person willfully and continually follows the victim or is in the presence of the victim without legal purpose and with the intent to cause emotional distress (To be illegal, it must occur more than once).

Harassing Phone Calls-using profane, indecent or threatening language against the victim over the phone or on answering machine or voicemail.

Sexual Assault Victims

A Sexual Assault includes any physical act of a sexual nature that takes place without consent of the victim. The victim may be forced, coerced, or manipulated. There is no statute of limitation for sexual assaults in the State of North Carolina. This means an investigation will be completed no matter how long it has been since the assault occurred. After a Sexual Assault:

- Get to a safe place.
- Allow hospital staff to complete a SANE exam, you can decide whether to prosecute later, once evidence is lost it's gone forever.
- Seek medical attention for any other injuries, prevention of STI's and/or pregnancy.

Application for Temporary Concealed Handgun Permit

The sheriff may issue a temporary permit for a period not to exceed 45 days to a person who the sheriff reasonably believes is in an emergency situation that may constitute a risk of safety to the person, the person's family or property. G.S. 14-415.13 (a)(1), (a) (2),(a)(3). The applicant may submit proof of a protective order issued under G.S. 50B-3 for the protection of the applicant as evidence of an emergency situation. The temporary order may not be renewed and may be revoked by the sheriff without a hearing G.S. 14-415.15(b). The applicant must present all of the following

- An application, completed under oath, on a form provided by the sheriff.
- A nonrefundable permit fee
- A full set of fingerprints of the applicant administered by the sheriff

SAVAN

The North Carolina Statewide Automated Victim Assistance and Notification program is a free, anonymous, computer-based telephone program that provides information and notification for victims. Victims can register to be notified on an offender's probation, parole, and post release supervision status. You may register by phone or online.
